Today's Gospel: Today is the first Sunday of Advent, which is also the first Sunday of a new liturgical year for the Church. The Advent season is a time of preparation for the coming of the Lord. In this season, we recall two central elements of our faith: the final coming of the Lord in glory and the incarnation of the Lord in the birth of Jesus. Key themes of the Advent season are watchful waiting, preparation, and justice.

In this new liturgical year, Lectionary Cycle A, the Gospel of Matthew will be the primary Gospel proclaimed. In today's Gospel, we hear Jesus speak about the need for wakefulness, for watchful waiting, for the coming of the Son of Man. Matthew's Gospel is dated by most scholars after the year 70 AD. Most believe that Matthew wrote for a primarily Jewish community, but one that was no longer centred on the Temple in Jerusalem. These were Jewish Christians trying to come to terms with their relationship to Judaism in a new situation: Judaism after the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem. There may have been Christians who believed that the events of the world around them gave evidence of the imminent return of the Lord in glory.

Today's passage from Matthew is rather straightforward. No one knows the precise time of the coming of the Lord in glory, so watchful waiting and vigilance are required. The passage speaks to the uselessness of looking for signs; there will be none. As a thief sneaks in during the night, so will be the Lord's coming in glory. The question for us as members of the Christian community is how do we prepare for this? Today's passage speaks more about the manner of waiting, rather than the details of the preparation. Jesus compares the vigilance required of Christians to the vigilance of a homeowner who knows the plans of the thief. If one knows that the thief's action is imminent, one remains watchful. As Christians, we know that our Lord is coming even if not the precise timing. Jesus calls us to be watchful and vigilant, like the homeowner - we become lax in our Christian living, we may be caught unprepared.

Advent Wreath: Today, the first Sunday of Advent, we place upon the sanctuary our Advent wreath. This is a circular garland of evergreen branches representing eternity on which five candles are arranged: three purple candles and one pink around the wreath and one white one at its centre. During the season of Advent, one candle on the wreath is lit each Sunday as a part of the Advent services. Each candle represents an aspect of the spiritual preparation for the coming of the Lord, Jesus Christ and as a whole, these candles represent the coming of the light of Christ into the world.

Each Sunday in Advent, a particular Advent candle is lit. Catholic tradition states that the four candles, representing the four weeks of Advent, each stands for one thousand years, to total the 4,000 years from the time of Adam and Eve until the birth of the Saviour.

On the first Sunday of Advent, the first purple candle is lit. This first candle represents hope or expectation in anticipation of the coming Messiah and is typically called the "Prophecy Candle" in remembrance of the prophets, primarily Isaiah, who foretold the birth of Christ:

Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign: The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and will call him Emmanuel.

World Youth Day: There will be a retiring collection after all Masses this weekend for the work of the Diocesan Youth service. This was due last Sunday on World Youth Day but has been carried over as it was not well publicised last week.

Church Cleaning: We are re-instating the cleaning rota for church and need volunteers to help spread the workload. If you can spare a couple of hours per month, and let's face it that's not much to ask, then please speak to Linis Dolby or email churchcleaning@marymagdalens.org. The more that can help, the less the load will be on any individuals. Thank you to those who attended yesterday to help with the deep clean of the church - these sessions will be repeated monthly.

Sacristans: We are looking to recruit some sacristans. These are responsible for preparation for Mass – ensuing that the altar, sacred vessels, gifts of bread and wine etc are ready beforehand. We have one person who has already come forward but more would be welcome – if you would like to be involved please speak to Fr Paul so that appropriate training can be arranged.

Altar Servers: We are also seeking more altar servers – girls or boys, young or old – who would like to be involved in this special ministry. We have two new volunteers who will be starting training but more will be very welcome. If you are interested, again please speak to Fr Paul.

Frank Sutton RIP: Many of you will remember Frank Sutton who with his wife Rosina, was very active in the parish and school in years past. Sadly Frank passed away on 1st November peacefully at home, with his family around him, after a long battle with cancer. A cremation has already taken place, but here will be a memorial Mass for Frank on Tuesday 29th November at 12 noon. Please pray for the repose of his soul, and for the comfort of his widow, family and friends who mourn his passing.

FIND Christmas Appeal 2022: In previous years, FIND has focussed its Christmas seasonal appeal on its *Giving Tree*, where individuals take a gift label from the tree, buy that gift, wrap and return it to the FIND tub. However, this year, primarily due to a shortage of storage space, the FIND Christmas appeal is for store gift cards which can be passed to those in Ipswich less fortunate than us. Between now and Christmas, FIND will be issuing some 900 food boxes to make sure it can provide for both Christmas and January. Having store vouchers will enable recipients to buy fresh foods or gifts of toys, clothes and other items. Suggested providers are Sainsbury's, ASDA, ALDI, Co-op, Waitrose, Smythes, The Entertainer toy store, Argos, Primark and M&S. Any vouchers must have receipts with them so that it is certain that they have been 'loaded'. Please put any donated vouchers, along with the corresponding receipt, in an envelope marked FIND and drop it in the collection plate at any Mass by Sunday 11th December to allow for collection and distribution.
