The Feast of Saint Peter and Saint Paul: Thursday is the feast of Saints Peter and Paul. Peter, who was named Simon, was a fisherman of Galilee and was introduced to the Lord Jesus by his brother Andrew. Jesus gave him the name Cephas (Petrus in Latin), which means 'Rock,' because he was to become a great leader - the rock upon which Christ would build His Church. St. Paul was the Apostle of the Gentiles. Before receiving the name Paul, he was Saul, a Jewish Pharisee who zealously persecuted Christians in Jerusalem. Saul's conversion took place as he was on his way to Damascus to persecute the Christian community there. Travelling along the road, he was suddenly surrounded by a great light from heaven. He was blinded and heard a voice saying to him, "Saul, Saul, why do you persecute me?" He answered: "Who are you, Lord?" The voice said: "I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting." Saul continued to Damascus, where he was baptised and his sight was restored. He took the name Paul and spent the remainder of his life preaching the Gospel tirelessly to the Mediterranean world. This major feast in the Church's calendar is one of only 6 Holy Days of Obligation on which all Catholics are required to attend Mass if possible, and Mass at St Mary Magdalen Church will be at 10:00 am and 7:00 pm.
