

A Message from Bishop Peter - On this Education Sunday we give thanks to almighty God for the work undertaken by all our Catholic Schools, Colleges and Universities across England and Wales. Our Catholic educational institutions are essential instruments in the mission of the Church and we can be proud of their achievements. I call on the diocesan family to pray for all who contribute to the great enterprise of Catholic education. We can rejoice that our children and young people are guided and supported by a great cohort of dedicated governors, leaders and staff.

Bishop Marcus Stock, who heads the Episcopal Conference Department for Catholic Education and Formation, writes: Christ is the foundation of the whole educational enterprise in a Catholic school. As "the way, the truth, and the life" Christ is both the object and subject of Catholic education. A Catholic educational institution seeks to root the gospel of Christ in the minds of students, providing a holistic formation that promotes human flourishing, inspiring a lifelong love of learning and fostering the virtues that will assist all people to discover in themselves and in others the truth, goodness and beauty of God.

The Diocese of East Anglia is blessed with a flourishing network of Catholic schools. Our schools are popular and highly regarded. I am happy to report that over the past year three more of our schools have joined, or are in the process of joining, one or other of our Catholic Multi-Academy Trusts (MAT) – the St. John the Baptist MAT or Our Lady of Walsingham MAT. With great generosity and professional commitment, these governors and directors offer their time and expertise to ensure that our schools provide the best possible Catholic environment for teaching and learning.

Today's Gospel: In today's Gospel reading, Jesus heals a man who was deaf and had a speech impediment. This is a story about Jesus' healing power, and in it we find clues about our understanding of sacrament. We are struck by the physical means used to heal the man, the use of spittle and touch. The Church continues to celebrate the sacraments using physical means. In the Sacrament of Baptism, water and oil are used to show the power of the Holy Spirit. In the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, we are anointed with holy oil on the forehead and the hands. In the Eucharist, bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ. We are a sacramental people who believe that God's grace is given to us through these physical signs. Some, however, see in this Gospel an image of the proclamation of the good news of Jesus to the Gentiles. The geographic references tell us that Jesus is journeying through Gentile territory. Jesus had previously visited this region and healed a person possessed by a demon and was already famous there, which explains why people brought the deaf man to him. The story that precedes this reading in Mark's Gospel sets the stage. Jesus encounters a Gentile, a Syrophoenician woman who asks him to heal her demon-possessed daughter. Jesus engages her in a dialogue about not feeding to dogs the food intended for children. Jesus is struck by the woman's great faith when she replies that even dogs eat the food that falls from the table, and he heals her daughter immediately. The faith of this Greek woman compels Jesus to respond to her plea. Mark shows that Jesus' own mission affirms the early Church's mission to the Gentiles. This was a significant issue to the early Christian community, which found that the good news of Jesus took root and spread guickly among the Gentiles. Yet there is an irony in the story of healing that Mark tells - Jesus gives the man the gift of speech, but then tells him not to use it. Jesus asks that the news of his healing power, which is evidence of his identity as the Messiah, not be spread. This is a recurring motif in Mark's Gospel and is sometimes called the "messianic secret." Courtesy Loyola Press

Next Weekend: Next Sunday is Evangelii Gaudium Sunday, formerly known as Home Mission Sunday, which is celebrated each year on the third Sunday in September. It gives us the opportunity to reflect on the great mandate we have been given by the Risen Lord to evangelise the whole world. "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations," the Lord commissions, as we hear in Matthew 28:19. On this day, we encourage the faithful to pray for our parish communities, that they would become intentionally missionary in their life and witness. As Pope Francis said in his Apostolic Exhortation entitled Evangelii Gaudium, "We cannot forget that evangelisation is first and foremost about preaching the Gospel to those who do not know Jesus Christ or who have always rejected him. Many of these are quietly seeking God, led by a yearning to see his face... Christians have the duty to proclaim the Gospel without excluding anyone." To help support the work of the Catholic Bishops Conference of England and Wales Mission Directorate, there will be a retiring collection taken at all Masses next weekend.
