Today's Gospel

In today's Gospel, Jesus asks the disciples for a field report by asking what others say about him. He then turns the question directly to the disciples and asks what they believe. Peter speaks for all of them when he announces that they believe Jesus to be the Christ. The word *Christ* is the Greek translation of the Hebrew word for Messiah, which means "the anointed one." At the time of Jesus, the image of the Messiah was laden with popular expectations, most of which looked for a political leader who would free the Jewish people from Roman occupation. Jesus does not appear to have used this term for himself, rather, as we see in today's reading, he refers to himself instead as the Son of Man, a term derived from the Jewish Scriptures, found in the Book of Daniel and in other apocryphal writings.

Now that the disciples have acknowledged Jesus as the Christ, Jesus confides in them the outcome of his ministry: he will be rejected, must suffer and die, and will rise after three days. Peter rejects this prediction, as the image of Christ that Jesus is giving is not the image of the Messiah that Peter was expecting, but Jesus rebukes him severely and then teaches the crowd and the disciples about the path of discipleship: to be Christ's disciple is to follow in the way of the cross. We can easily miss the fear that Jesus' words must have evoked in his disciples - death by crucifixion was all too familiar as a method of execution in Roman-occupied territories and an omnipresent danger to the Christian community for whom Mark wrote. The path that Jesus was inviting his disciples to share meant tremendous suffering and death. This is the kind of radical commitment and sacrifice that Jesus calls us to adopt for the sake of the Gospel.

Home Mission: Sunday 16th September

Today is Home Mission Sunday – this is celebrated each year in the Catholic Church, on the third Sunday of September. On this day the Bishops invite parishes to pray for the mission of the Church in England and Wales and there is a second collection to support the Bishops' work of evangelisation. The Home Mission Desk sits within the Department for Evangelisation and Catechesis and acts as a point of reference for evangelisation in dioceses, movements and Catholic organisations in England and Wales. It also helps to develop and produce resources for the formation of adult faith and coordinates additional projects as instructed by the Department. The Desk is also responsible for responding to enquiries that come in to the Catholic Faith Enquiry Office. There will be a retiring collection after all Masses today for Home Missions.

Mass Readings for the Twenty Fourth Sunday of Ordinary Time (Year B) 16th September 2018

Entrance Antiphon:

Give peace, O Lord, to those who wait for you, that the prophets be found true. Hear the prayers of your servant, and of your people Israel.

Collect:

Look upon us, O God, creator and ruler of all things, and, that we may feel the working of your mercy, grant that we may serve you with all our heart. Through Our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God for ever and ever.

First Reading: Isa. 0:5-9 I offered my back to those who struck me.

The Lord has opened my ear. For my part, I made no resistance, neither did I turn away. I offered my back to those who struck me, my cheek to those who tore at my beard; I did not cover my face against insult and spittle. The Lord comes to my help, so that I am untouched by the insults. So, too, I set my face like flint; I know I shall mot be shamed. My vindicator is here at hand. Does anyone start proceedings against me? Then let us go to court together. Who thinks he has a case against me? Let him approach me. The Lord is coming to my help, who dare condemn me?

Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 114:1-6, 8-9

I will walk in the presence of the Lord, in the land of the living.

Second Reading: James 2:11-18 If good works do not go with faith, it is quite dead.

Take the case, my brothers, of someone who has never done a single good act but claims he has faith. Will that faith save him? If one of the brothers or one of the sisters is in need of clothes and has not enough food to live on, and one of you says to them, "I wish you well; keep yourself warm and eat plenty", without giving them these bare necessities of life, then what good is that? Faith is like that: if good works do not go with it, it is quite dead. This is the way to talk to people of that kind: "You say you have faith and I have good deeds; I will prove to you that I have faith by showing my good deeds – now you prove to me that you have faith without any good deeds to show."

Gospel Acclamation:

Alleluia, alleluia! I am the way, the truth and the life, says the Lord; no one can come to the Father except through me. Alleluia!

Gospel: Mark 8:27-35 You are the Christ. The Son of Man is destined to suffer grievously. Jesus and his disciples left for the villages round Caesarea Philippi. On the way he put this question to the disciples, "Who do people say I am?" And they told him. "John the Baptist", they said, "others Elijah; others again one of the prophets." "But you", he asked, "who do you say I am". Peter spoke up and said to him, "You are the Christ". And he gave them strict orders not to tell anyone about him. And he began to teach them that the Son of Man was destined to suffer grievously, to be rejected by the elders and the chief priests and the scribes, and be out to death, and after three days to rise again; and he said all this quite openly. Then, taking him aside, Peter started to remonstrate with him. But, turning and seeing his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said to him "Get behind me, Satan! Because the way you think is not God's way but man's". He called the people and his disciples to him and said, "If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me. For anyone who wants to save his life will lose it; but anyone who loses his life for my sake, and the sake of the gospel, will save it".

Look with favour on our supplications, O Lord, and in your kindness accept these, your servants' offerings, that what each has offered to the honour of your name may serve the salvation of all. Through Christ our Lord.
