Today's Gospel

The second parable that Jesus tells in Luke 18 addresses attitude to prayer. In contrasting the prayer of the Pharisee with the prayer of the tax collector, Jesus teaches his disciples to pray in humility before God. Jesus again surprises his listeners by showing the tax collector as the example of faith, rather than the Pharisee. Remember that Pharisees were members of a sect of Judaism active in Jesus' time. They taught an oral interpretation of the Law of Moses as the basis for Jewish piety. If anyone would be a model for prayer, a Pharisee was a likely candidate. In contrast, Jesus offers the tax collector as a model for prayer. Tax collectors were collaborators with the Roman authorities in a system that allowed the tax collectors to line their own pockets by charging in excess of the defined taxes. Yet, in this parable, Jesus offers the humility of the tax collector as a model for the prayer of a disciple. The parable reminds us that when we pray, we must remember our need for God in our lives. If we are too full of ourselves, there is too little room for God's grace to work in us.

All Saints Day

Friday of this week, 1st November, is All Saints' Day, a solemn holy day of the Catholic Church celebrated annually. The day is dedicated to the saints of the Church, that is, all those who have attained heaven whether recognised as saints by the church or not. It is a Holy Day of Obligation, on which all Catholics are required to attend Mass. Mass will be celebrated in the morning at 9:30 and at 7:00 pm.

All Souls Day

Saturday, 2nd November, is All Souls Day, or more correctly called the Commemoration of all the Faithful Departed. It is not a Holy Day of Obligation, but many like to additionally attend Mass on this feast to pray especially for all those family members, friends, associates and other acquaintances who have passed away.

November - The Month of Remembrance

The parish community as a whole will pray for the departed souls from our parish in the month of November. If you have anyone to be specially remembered, please write his or her name on a piece of paper and put it in the box on the altar. The box will remain on the altar for the whole month of November. There are also special envelopes in the Narthex to offer Masses for the dead.

All Souls-Tide Blessing of Graves

The traditional Blessing of Graves in the Ipswich cemetery will take place on Sunday, November 3rd at 3 pm. We assemble in the Lawn Cemetery, and after saying together Afternoon Prayer from the Office of the Dead, clergy will be available to be taken to, and bless, individual graves.

Readings for 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time – Year C: 27th October, 2019

Entrance Antiphon:

Let the hearts that seek the Lord rejoice; turn to the Lord and his strength; constantly seek his face.

Collect:

Almighty ever-living God, increase our faith, hope and charity, and make us love what you command, so that we may merit what you promise. Through Our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.

First Reading: Ecc. 35:12-14, 16-19 The humble man's prayer pierces the clouds.

The Lord is a judge who is no respecter of personages. He shows no respect of personages to the detriment of the poor man, he listens to the plea of the injured party. He does not ignore the orphan's supplication, nor the widow's as she pours out her story. The man who with his whole heart serves God will be accepted, his petitions will carry to the clouds. The humble man's prayer pierces the clouds, until it arrives he is inconsolable, nor will he desist until the Most High takes notice of him, acquits the virtuous and delivers judgement. And the Lord will not be slow, nor will he be dilatory on their behalf.

Responsorial Psalm: Ps. 32:2-3, 17-19, 23 This poor man called; the Lord heard him.

Second Reading: 2Tim. 4:6-8, 16-18 All there is to come now is the crown of righteousness reserved for me. My life is already being poured away as a libation, and the time has come for me to be gone. I have fought the good fight to the end; I have run the race to the finish; I have kept the faith; all there is to come now is the crown of righteousness reserved for me, which the Lord, the righteous judge, will give to me on that day; and not only to me but to all those who have longed for his Appearing. The first time I had to present my defence, there was not a single witness to support me. Every one of them deserted me – may they not be held accountable for it. But the Lord stood by me and gave me power, so that through me the whole message might be proclaimed for all the pagans to hear; and so I was rescued from the lion's mouth. The Lord will rescue me from all evil attempts on me, and bring me safely to his heavenly kingdom. To him be glory for ever and ever. Amen.

Gospel Acclamation:

Alleluia, Alleluia! Blessed are you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, for revealing the mysteries of the kingdom to mere children. Alleluia!

Gospel: Luke 18:9-14 The publican went home at rights with God; the Pharisee did not.

Jesus spoke the following parable to some people who prided themselves on being virtuous and despised everyone else: "Two men went up to the Temple to pray, one a Pharisee, the other a tax collector. The Pharisee stood there and said this prayer to himself, 'I thank you, God, that I am not grasping, unjust, adulterous like the rest of mankind, and particularly that I am not like this tax collector here. I fast twice a week; I pay tithes on all that I get.' The tax collector stood some distance away, not daring even to raise his eyes to heaven; but he beat his breast and said. 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner.' This man, I tell you, went home at rights with God; the other did not. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the man who humbles himself will be exalted."
