Under the current restrictions there will be no Children's Liturgy group, no coffee after church and no hymns sung at 10:00 Mass. The bidding prayers will not be said, the homily will be kept short, the collection and offertory procession will be omitted, the sign of peace will not be exchanged and special arrangements for Holy Communion will apply. We are committed to following the Government guidelines on social distancing. Please ensure you maintain a 2 metre distance separation from each other whilst entering, leaving and inside church and remember that government regulations require that you wear a face covering whilst in church.

Today's Gospel

This week we return to the liturgical season of Ordinary Time. This Sunday and next Sunday, however, are designated as solemnities, special days that call our attention to the central mysteries of our faith. Today, on the first Sunday after Pentecost, we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity. This feast invites us to consider what we believe about God, who has revealed himself to us in the Trinity, one God in three Persons. The Gospel for this Solemnity is taken from the Gospel of Matthew. In its conclusion, Matthew's Gospel quickly moves from the disciples' discovery of Jesus' empty tomb and Jesus' appearance to Mary Magdalene and the other Mary to the commission that Jesus gives to his disciples in today's Gospel.

The final commission, as this part of Matthew's Gospel is sometimes called, is given on the mountaintop. Throughout Scripture, many of the most important events happen on a mountaintop, and Matthew used this motif often. Peter, James, and John saw Jesus transfigured on the mountaintop, and Jesus taught the crowds from the mountaintop in the Sermon on the Mount. In today's Gospel, the eleven disciples go the mountaintop in Galilee, as Jesus had instructed them through Mary Magdalene and the other Mary. They see Jesus, and they worship and doubt at the same time. Jesus approaches them and commissions them to baptise and teach. It is a task for which Jesus had previously prepared his disciples; recall that Jesus had already sent the twelve apostles to preach the Kingdom of God and to heal. Yet earlier, the Twelve were sent only to the House of Israel; in this final commission, the eleven are told to go to all nations. The mission of Jesus is now to be taken to all people, and the task is to baptise and to teach.

Jesus commissions his disciples to baptise in the name of the Trinity; this is one of the clearest attestations for Baptism in the name of the Holy Trinity found in Scripture. Other New Testament references to Baptism describe it as being celebrated in the name of Jesus. As we read this Gospel on the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, we are reminded that this central mystery of faith is meant to be lived. As baptised Christians, we share in the life of the blessed Trinity and seek to invite others to share in God's love.

The Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity

Each year on the first Sunday after Pentecost we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, also known as Trinity Sunday. Although it wasn't until 1334 that Pope John XXII officially established the feast for universal observance in the Western Church, the mystery of the Holy Trinity has been the pulse of the Church's life since the very beginning. The Trinity is "the central mystery of Christian faith and life and is the source of all the other mysteries of faith" (Catechism of the Catholic Church 234). The whole of the Church's life flows from the central belief that the one true God exists as three divine Persons - Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Since the very beginning of time, God has gradually revealed and communicated the truth of who he is as Trinitarian through what he has done in salvation history. Although God gradually revealed himself throughout different stages of the Old Testament period of salvation history, mankind had no way of knowing the full truth of God's inner life of the Trinity before the time of Christ, since this mystery of our faith is "inaccessible to human reason alone...before the Incarnation of God's Son and the sending of the Holy Spirit" (CCC 237). Trinity Sunday is an invitation to remember that "being Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction"

"I will not leave you orphans!" If Jesus has promised to never leave us orphans, then that means we have a permanent home - we eternally belong to the Father as children of his heavenly household! This is the mystery into which the Church invites us more deeply on the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity. Yet this truth is also the very gift that that we are invited to share with all whom God entrusts to us in our daily lives: "Love one another as I have loved you" (John 15:12). Every human heart longs for its eternal home. Today, we invite the Trinity to be more at home in our hearts in order to make them a more welcoming home for others - that through our smile, our gentleness, our availability of heart, everyone whom the Father entrusts to us may experience the love that is their eternal home.

First Holy Communion

Next Sunday, the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi), we celebrate the first Holy communion of Gracjan and Gabriel during the Mass at 10.00 am. The celebration will not affect the regular Mass attendance as the families will be seated where the servers usually sit.

New Parish Room

The new parish room building is now nearing completion. The work to remodel the front of the church, the access ramp and the entrance to the new room has been delayed slightly due to a delay in obtaining confirmation from the local council on the safety railings to be installed at the top of the steps. Hopefully this will be resolved quickly allowing the final elements of the project to be completed.

Parish 150 Club

The Club accounts for year ending 31st March 2021, have been audited, signed off and reported to the Local Council as required by the Gambling Act. The results are:

Total income: £2,773 Prizes awarded: £1095 (39%) Expenses: £20 Parish Contribution: £1,658.

The proceeds to the parish were increased by a further £72 representing prizes donated by the winners to parish funds.

Last year's figures bring the total income generated by the 150 Club since it started to £88,475, the total prizes distributed to £37,041 and the total contribution to the parish to £50,747. Thank you to everybody who supported the 150 Club last year, especially as, with Covid restrictions adversely affecting so much of our lives, subscriptions were maintained. However, we always have room for more, so if you are not yet a member of the 150 Club, please do join and help support your parish through this venture.

The May prize draw of the 150 Club will be made today after the 10:00 Mass in the Guild Room.

May receiving this Sacrament, O Lord our God, bring us health of body and soul, as we confess your eternal holy Trinity and undivided Unity. Through Christ Our Lord.
