Under the current restrictions there will be no Children's Liturgy group, no coffee after church and no hymns sung at 10:00 Mass. The homily will be kept short, the collection and offertory procession will be omitted, the sign of peace will not be exchanged and special arrangements for Holy Communion will apply. Although no longer mandatory, we are committed to following Government guidance on social distancing. Please ensure you maintain a 2 metre distance separation from each other whilst entering, leaving and inside church and remember that Government guidance is still that you wear a face covering whilst in church.

Today's Gospel

Today's feast celebrates Mary's Assumption into heaven. It is one of three feasts of Mary that are Holy Days of Obligation for Catholics. January 1 is the feast of Mary, the Mother of God, and December 8 is the feast of the Immaculate Conception of Mary. The assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary into heaven has long been held as an important Catholic belief. The belief was not defined as dogma, however, until 1950 by Pope Pius XII. The dogma teaches that Mary, who was without sin, was taken, body and soul, into the glory of heaven.

The Gospel for this holy day recalls Mary's actions after the announcement of Jesus' birth by the Angel Gabriel. Mary goes to visit her cousin Elizabeth who is also with child. Elizabeth greets Mary with full recognition of the roles they and their unborn children will play in God's plan for salvation. Mary responds to Elizabeth's greeting with her song of praise, the Magnificat. Both women recall and echo God's history of showing favour upon the people of Israel. Mary's Magnificat, in particular, echoes the song of praise offered by Hannah, the mother of Samuel.

The Gospel for this day reminds us that Mary's Assumption into heaven is best understood with regard for the full spectrum of Catholic beliefs about the person of Christ and the person of Mary. Only Mary, who was born without stain of original sin - the Immaculate Conception - could give birth to Christ, who is fully God and fully human. This is called the Immaculate Conception. Because of Mary's role in God's plan of salvation, she does not suffer from the effects of sin, which are death and decay. Mary is the first to receive the fullness of the redemption that her son has won for all of humanity. The Church, therefore, recognises Mary as the sign of the salvation promised to all.

Today's Gospel highlights Mary's faith. Mary's faith enabled her to recognise the work of God in her people's history and in her own life. Her openness to God allowed God to work through her so that salvation might come to all. Mary is a model and symbol of the Church. May we be like Mary, open and cooperative in God's plan of salvation.

Petition for an Apology

Fr Mathew writes: "I would like to encourage you all to sign a petition (you may choose not to do so) for an adoption apology for women and their babies, now adults who were cruelly separated by past forced adoption practices. A study in 1968 of mother and baby homes revealed that 11.6% of the homes were run by the Catholic Church. I am aware that it all happened, including the study even before I was born and in countries that I thought I would never be in. (Well, India had worse incidents and they have not addressed them yet). But there is a collective Catholic responsibility to encourage healing. The New Parish Room

Since last report in April, the total donated in response to the Parish Room appeal, including Gift Aid, now stands at £15,700. This means we have exceeded our initial target of £15,000 and have been able to complete the new room.

In consultation with our builder and architect we have agreed to extend the works on the frontage to allow for (a) the replacement of a greater area of concrete at the drive entrance and (b) to raise the height of the ramp retaining wall to help reduce the cost of the railings which, due to issues of supply, have risen steeply in cost over the last few months.

Any further donations to help offset the additional costs involved which are expected to be in the region of £8,000 to £10,000 would therefore be warmly welcomed.

Step 4 Guidance from the CBCEW

David gathered all Israel together to bring the ark of God up to the place he had prepared for it. David called together the sons of Aaron and the sons of Levi. And the Levites carried the ark of God with the shafts on their shoulders, as Moses had ordered in accordance with the word of the Lord. David then told the heads of the Levites to assign duties for their kinsmen as cantors, with their various instruments of music, harps and lyres and cymbals, to play joyful tunes.
